FEATURE >>>> County Seeks Community **Engagement for New** Comprehensive Plan

Rockland County is updating its Countywide Comprehensive Plan. The last County Plan was adopted in 2011. While some of the land use challenges facing the County remain the same, many things have changed as the County continues to grow. The planning process kicked off earlier this year and is intended to last approximately 18 months, culminating with an adopted Plan in the Fall of 2026.

A County comprehensive plan is a long-term, strategic document that outlines a county's vision and priorities for land use, zoning, development, and growth, serving as a guide for decision-making on issues like infrastructure, housing, and economic development. A County-wide comprehensive plan provides a broader perspective than a municipal land use plan, providing insight and guidance on issues and opportunities that may cross town or village 1

boundaries. The Plan will outline goals, policies, and strategies to guide local decision-making on land use, housing, transportation, community services, environmental protection, etc.

plan's development is being overseen by the County Planning Department and guided by a Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) and a Community Advisory Working Group, ensuring both technical expertise and community input shape this critical undertaking. The County Planning Department has retained a land use consulting firm, BFJ Planning, to provide professional land use planning services to assist in drafting the Plan. The project has been named "Envision Rockland". The County works to create an inclusive process whereby all members of the Rockland County community can engage and participate in the Plan to ensure a stakeholder-driven vision and publicly supported Plan. It is the County's goal to ensure that community priorities are integral to the Plan's vision, goals, and strategies. The project website is www.envisionrockland.com

Once adopted, The County Plan will serve as the basis for all County government planning and development issues for the next 10-20 years, provide guidance for future planning and zoning actions by Rockland's towns and villages, and create a framework for future capital expenditures by the County government.

>>> County Business Survey Spurs **Creation of Small Business Support Program**

At the end of 2024, Rockland County conducted a survey of businesses to gain an understanding of their challenges and most pressing needs. overwhelming majority of respondents (74%) were businesses with fewer than 20 employees, and 56% fall into the category defined as "microbusinesses" with less than 10 employees.

The survey revealed that these small businesses are most interested in support in the following areas: Grants and Incentives, Marketing, Networking, and Workforce Development.

Respondents also noted the following as their greatest challenges: Business Growth, Rising Costs, Hiring or Retaining Workers, and Raising Capital.

As a result of this feedback, the County has partnered with the Women's Enterprise Development Center and Community Capital New York to offer customized training, workshops, and one-on-one technical assistance to Rockland County's small businesses.

Each partner brings a team of knowledgeable experts to the table, and while programming is still being fine-tuned, topics such as accessing capital, branding and marketing, and sales growth will be the focus. Weekly office hours will also be accessible to program participants. All services will be offered FREE of charge to Rockland County businesses.

According to the County's Director of Economic Development & Tourism, Jenna Nazario, "Our goal with these programs is to provide a boost for small businesses so they can build their capacity when they are ready. It's an investment that the County is making to ensure a sustainable economy today and for future generations."

SUCCESS STORY

>>> Meet Yehuda Reich: The Challenger Behind Stack Street Coffee

Upon meeting Yehuda Reich, one quickly senses his forward momentum. He's not someone who sits back and waits for things to happen. His vision for Stack Street Coffee has grown rapidly, yet deliberately, since launching nearly a decade ago in a modest office within the Historic District. Today, Garner company spans nearly 50,000 square feet of manufacturing and distribution across multiple buildings in the landmarked industrial complex in Garnerville, New York as well as other smaller locations in NY and NJ.

A lifelong Rockland County resident, Reich has kept his roots strong—most of his 30 to 35 employees also live locally.

Before founding Stack Street, Reich built a successful career in e-commerce, gaining deep insights into product marketing, sales, and logistics. This vantage point gave him a unique window into various industries and a clear opportunity in one: coffee. He recognized a gap in the market for high-quality coffee delivered more efficiently and affordably. That insight sparked the creation of Stack Street Coffee, originally launched under the tagline, "Great coffee shouldn't be reserved for the highest bidder."

Stack Street's success didn't go unnoticed. Other coffee brands began turning to them for help with logistics, product development, and distribution. "They could focus on marketing and sales," Reich explains, "and we'd handle the product development, manufacturing and fulfillment. That became a great business model for us."





Meet Yehuda Reich: The Challenger Behind Stack Street Coffee (continued)

Today, Stack Street serves customers across North America and as far afield as Australia and the Middle East, including major national grocery and retail chains. As Reich describes it, Stack Street is a "challenger company" large enough to deliver tailored solutions at scale (organic, kosher, compostable solutions, K-Cups, Rainforest Alliance-certified—you name it), yet small enough to stay nimble and flexible. The biggest competitor, Reich says, isn't another brand or company, it's inertia.

When asked what he believes drives lasting business success, Reich shares:

"Constantly thinking about how something can be improved—that's the hallmark of a strong businessperson. But you can also overanalyze and never act. At some point, you've got to just do it.

At the same time, you have to always be questioning your assumptions. You need to be willing to do a complete 180 if you realize something isn't working. I do this more often than I care to admit—much to the chagrin of my coworkers and family!

Whatever the 'thing' is for you—just doing it, and then iterating obsessively, is a massive unlock.

Of course, none of this would be possible without two things.

First, my incredibly supportive wife. I've seen firsthand how much it helps to have someone in your corner who understands your mission, your drive, and shows up for you every day (and you for them, of course!). On the flip side, I've also seen far too many talented people held back by unsupportive partners. Choose wisely.

And last—but definitely not least—is G-d. All of my success is thanks to Him."
